
Several students attended the Ngati Whatua Tertiarry Summit recently, which was based at Mahurehure Marae in Pt Chevalier.

Our first night we attended sessions including Smoking Cessation (Mike Pocklington), Mission Ready (Alan Kahn) and a Te Tiriti o Waitangi presentation.

Our first morning was full of a Mau Rakau session with Matua Sam, to get us energized for the day before we headed to the Unitec campus for a pōwhiri, tour of the trades, apprenticeship and courses information sessions. After pōwhiri in the campus wharenui - Te Noho Kōtahitanga - we separated into 5 groups and were taken on a tour of the facilities: Digital/Creative and Performing Arts; Trades (Engineering/Plumbing/Automotive); Animal Care and Husbandry; Building; and Architecture. That evening we attended the Formal Dinner with guest speakers MMA fighter Mike "Blood" Diamond, Hon. Kelvin Davis MP, Dr Mataroria Lyndon and Te Tai Tokerau Green Party candidate Hūhana Lyndon. Our Deputy Principal, Takiri Pumipi, was also acknowledged for her commitment to the Tertiary Summit programme since its inception.

On our final day we had, an early wake up call at 5.30am to pack up and get ready for our visit to the AUT City Campus. We arrived at the University for the Pōwhiri and spent the rest of the day exploring the campus for ourselves and seeing the course options the University offers. We met up together after lunch and headed home.

This is a fantastic opportunity for students to explore the tertiary providers and see the many options available and is a trip well worth attending. Thank you to everyone who was involved in the organisation of the event and Mr Amoroa and Mrs Pumipi for accompanying the students over the three days.

Parents and whānau - keeping children safe from cyberbullying

It is important that you work with your child to agree on a plan of action that supports them but doesn't harm their social life further or reduce their contact with friends. Save offending text messages and take screenshots of any abuse online. Report internet cyberbullying to the website where the bullying took place. Usually there is a 'report abuse' button or 'safety' link, as well as a 'block sender / user' link. You can also report an incident to NetSafe, using their online form.

Many social networking sites such as Facebook have a 'block' or 'report' function where a student can enter the user names of people bothering them or people they want to avoid If bullying occurs through text messages, contact your child's mobile phone company and ask them to take action. Phone companies have an agreement to liaise with each other and take Action, where appropriate. They can block numbers or disable an account (that the texts or calls are originating from).

If the bullying involves another student at your child's school or it's affecting your child at school, talk to the school. Parents and whānau should regularly remind children not to post or share images they don't want spread further, including email, pxt and txt.

How can I support my child with NCEA?

Your child will be expected to complete work started in class, study for tests, undertake projects or assignments, prepare for new work, practise work they've learnt and do their own research. They need to be organised, be able to prioritise what is important, and be clear about the marking criteria for all assessments.

Some ways you could help your child learn include:

- Talk with your child's teacher or Dean to ensure your child is enrolled for the right subjects to get where they want to go and meet their aspirations
- Help your child manage their time. Together make a timetable of assignment and assessment dates
- Work with them to set goals and put them up around the house
- Help them develop good work and study habits. Get them to make time each day to read and study
- Create a place to work. If not at home, then maybe a local library, or a relative's home.
- Create a network of 'go to' people who can help with different subjects – these could be peer homework groups, friends or neighbours, whanau or professional tutors
- Celebrate good work and effort
