LITERACY AT DHS

Your student may recently have sat one or more of the NCEA co-requisite literacy (and numeracy) exams, the standalone exams which are part of the NCEA. Literacy doesn't start and finish with the exams, though – at DHS, we are working school-wide to strengthen the literacy skills of all our students. Over the next few newsletters, look out for more tips and information about ways you can support your student at home to develop his or her literacy skills.

What is literacy?

Literacy is the ability to read and write so that we can communicate effectively and make sense of the world around us.

Just a few reasons literacy skills are important

Success at school!

Students with strong reading and writing skills do better at school as it is easier for them to do the work and access the learning.

Maths!

Strong reading skills are even linked to success in maths.

Better job opportunities!

People with higher levels of literacy are more likely to have better paying jobs when they leave school.

Quality of life: People with higher levels of literacy generally have better health outcomes.

RED! Read Every Day

Here is one small but really significant way you can support your student to develop literacy skills: **encourage them to read - <u>every day!</u>** Putting down their phones and picking up a book for twenty minutes would have a huge effect on their learning, over time.

Stuck for ideas? Check out the *Reading Corner* in our newsletters or ask your student, "If somebody wrote the perfect book for you, what would it be about?" and then encourage them to ask our fantastic librarian, Tamara, for help to find it. Dargaville also has a really great town library, so there are plenty of books around to choose from! **There is truly a book out there for everyone!**

Model United Nations



Congratulations to Sapna Reddy and Joanna Azariah who participated in MUNA (Model United Nations Assembly).

MUNA is a one-day-event that encourages students to learn about other nations and to understand and appreciate the workings of the United Nations (UN) while they develop debating skills and gain self-confidence in public speaking.

Joanna was allocated Qatar and Sapna had to study China. They both researched history, politics, economics, peoples, international alignment and policies, and then they debated selected resolutions from each country's point of view in a simulated United Nations Assembly.

The debates reproduced genuine UN debates often with a fine flow of rhetoric, points of order, motions of dissent, bloc walkouts and corruption (in the form of a chocolate bar!)


OKS Reading Corner



The Last Paper Crane by Kerry Drewery


What would it do to you as a person to live through your city being destroyed by an atomic bomb?

The Last Paper Crane is about the 1945 Hiroshima bombing in Japan. Japanese teenager, Mizuki, learns that her grandfather lived through the horror of it. This book is not written like a typical novel and has haiku (a type of Japanese poetry) included in it.

The Percy Jackson series by Rick Riordan

Imagine discovering that you are a demi-god: son of a human and Poseidon, Greek god of the sea! This is what Percy Jackson, 12 years old, discovers while on summer camp. Percy is then sent on an important mission by Zeus, the king of the gods.

If you like adventure, mythology, the idea of being a hero – or even just a really exciting read – check out this series. Start with the first one, *The Lightning Thief*.
